# **INVOCATION & INVITATION TO WORSHIP**

## THE GOSPEL

## John 11:17-27, 38-45

<sup>17</sup> On his arrival, Jesus found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. <sup>18</sup> Now Bethany was less than two miles from Jerusalem, <sup>19</sup> and many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to comfort them in the loss of their brother. <sup>20</sup> When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went out to meet him, but Mary stayed at home. <sup>21</sup> "Lord," Martha said to Jesus, "if you had been here, my brother would not have died. <sup>22</sup> But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask." <sup>23</sup> Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." <sup>24</sup> Martha answered, "I know he will rise again in the resurrection at the last day." <sup>25</sup> Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; <sup>26</sup> and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?" <sup>27</sup> "Yes, Lord," she replied, "I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, who is to come into the world."

<sup>38</sup> Jesus, once more deeply moved, came to the tomb. It was a cave with a stone laid across the entrance. <sup>39</sup> "Take away the stone," he said. "But, Lord," said Martha, the sister of the dead man, "by this time there is a bad odor, for he has been there four days." <sup>40</sup> Then Jesus said, "Did I not tell you that if you believe, you will see the glory of God?" <sup>41</sup> So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. <sup>42</sup> I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me." <sup>43</sup> When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" <sup>44</sup> The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face. Jesus said to them, "Take off the grave clothes and let him go." <sup>45</sup> Therefore many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary, and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him.<sup>1</sup>

# THE MESSAGE

II Kings 4:18-37

# Theme: Everything is All Right

Ask anyone how they are doing in quarantine and you might get, "Everything is alright. Good. Things are alright." Ask them a second time how things are going in quarantine and you might start to get different answers, "disappointed" "scared" "nervous" "anxious" "uneasy." When someone asks us how we are doing, we often respond to the effect that "everything is all right" even when everything is not alright. So how is that you and I can say it and believe in our hearts, "Everything is all right?"

To find the answer we turn to 2 Kings 4. I remember calling her "The Shunamite" growing up. We are never told her name. But it is clear she is a believer. At the time there weren't many believers in Israel. Many had turned away from God. The Shunamite woman recognized God's prophet as a "Man of God." She was so strong a believer she wanted to help with the preaching of God's Word in her region, so she had convinced her husband they should put an addition on the house where the Elisha the prophet could stay at their house when he was in the area. The Lord had blessed her with a miracle child in her old age. Everything was all right in her life...then the dark clouds rolled in.

II Kings 4:18-25, <sup>18</sup> The child grew, and one day he went out to his father, who was with the reapers. <sup>19</sup> He said to his father, "My head! My head!" His father told a servant, "Carry him to his mother." <sup>20</sup> After the servant had lifted him up and carried him to his mother, the boy sat on her lap until noon, and then he died. <sup>21</sup> She went up and laid him on the bed of the man of God, then shut the door and went out. <sup>22</sup> She called her husband and said, "Please send me one of the servants and a donkey so I can go to the man of God quickly and return." <sup>23</sup> "Why go to him today?" he asked. "It's not the New Moon or the Sabbath." "That's all right," she said. <sup>24</sup> She saddled the donkey and said to her servant, "Lead on; don't slow down for me unless I tell you." <sup>25</sup> So she set out and came to the man of God at Mount Carmel. <sup>2</sup>

This woman is in the awful position of losing her child. What we learn from the story is how she dealt with the suffering. She runs first to the Lord. Technically she runs to the Elisha, the Man of God. Why? She knew that the Man of God represented God. She knew the words he had were from God, they were power, and they were life. She knew that the words of God could strengthen her in weakness and bring comfort in her distress. She runs to him.

When he saw her in the distance, the man of God said to his servant Gehazi, "Look! There's the Shunammite! <sup>26</sup> Run to meet her and ask her, 'Are you all right? Is your husband all right? Is your child all right?' " "Everything is all right," she said. <sup>27</sup> When she reached the man of God at the mountain, she took hold of his feet. Gehazi came over to push her away, but the man of God said, "Leave her alone! She is in bitter distress, but the Lord has hidden it from me and has not told me why." <sup>28</sup> "Did I ask you for a son, my lord?" she said. "Didn't I tell you, 'Don't raise my hopes'?" <sup>29</sup> Elisha said to Gehazi, "Tuck your cloak into your belt, take my staff in your hand and run. Don't greet anyone you meet, and if anyone greets you, do not answer. Lay my staff on the boy's face." <sup>30</sup> But the child's mother said, "As surely as the Lord lives and as you live, I will not leave you." So he got up and followed her. <sup>3</sup> You can hear how the Shunammite woman isn't going to give up on going to the Lord. What a picture of faith! What an example for us when storms strike, when the dark clouds roll in we cry out to God, we don't let go, we don't let go of him and the promises he gives us.

It is not is not just her conviction and her clinging to God's servant that is so amazing. It is where she goes first! Do we go to the Lord first in prayer first or as a last resort? We pray to him in times of a pandemic, to be sure, but what happens when the pandemic subsides? When a kid is struggling, when the job is lost, when the spouse is near life's end, then we run to the Lord. But where are the prayers of thanksgiving for the child or the spouse or the job when things are going

well? Do we run to the Lord first and fast in the good times and the dark times? On this dark day in the Shunamite's life, notice what allows her to say Everything is all right, "She runs to the Lord first and fast? Do we do the same?

Do you know what the Lord promises to do? He will help. Like a child calling out in distress to his or her Father for help, God our Father says, "Call upon me in the day of trouble, and I will deliver you." That doesn't mean he will always help in the way we expect. Remember the Gospel reading? Did Jesus jump up to go and help the Lazarus the moment he heard about him being sick? Jesus dawdled. From Mary and Martha's perspective, Jesus was late. Lazarus was dead for four days when Jesus arrived. Why didn't Jesus come sooner? It wasn't what they expected in their call for help. But you remember how that turned out.

Elisha sends Gehazi ahead to lay the staff of Elisha on the boys face. Nothing. With a sullen face Gehazi, Elisha's servant, reports back to Elisha, "The boy has not awakened" (:31).

<sup>32</sup> When Elisha reached the house, there was the boy lying dead on his couch. <sup>33</sup> He went in, shut the door on the two of them and prayed to the Lord. <sup>34</sup> Then he got on the bed and lay on the boy, mouth to mouth, eyes to eyes, hands to hands. As he stretched himself out on him, the boy's body grew warm. <sup>35</sup> Elisha turned away and walked back and forth in the room and then got on the bed and stretched out on him once more. The boy sneezed seven times and opened his eyes.<sup>4</sup> You can picture the scene, can't you? Elijah is flummoxed as to what to do, he begins to pace and pray at the same time. Sometimes the Lord makes us pace as he carries out his plans for us. See what happened? In his own time and his own way, God brought this child back to life. Everything was all right because God helps in his own time and his own way.

Everything is all right because God helps in his own time and his own way. What a reminder in the times that we live in. The cases of the virus increase. The number of deaths rises in our country. It seems that the pockets of hot spots where it spreading is increasing and getting closer to home. Maybe you say, "All is fine, everything is all right" but anxious or nervous, or depressed describes things you are dealing with on the inside.

What happens when events around us leave us with a feeling worried, scared? What happens when tragedy strikes close to home and the dark clouds roll in? What is our plan? Can we really say, "Everything is all right?" What is our plan? Do we rely on a multi-faceted approach to rescue us, to allow us to say "all is well." Do we rely on modern medicine? A Stimulus package and Some wisdom from county and government leaders and health officials? To be sure, all of these can be blessings from God, leaders should be respected, medicine and stimulus dollars can be used to God's glory. But does the execution of vaccines and stimulus bills make everything all right?

Like Elisha who thought it would be as easy as a staff on the face of the dead boy, we can wish that our biggest problems can go away with our plans. But God's plan is often different. God's plan was certainly different in the face of the greatest tragedy, the problem we are all trying to avoid - death itself. At just the right time, in his own way and on his own time, God sent his Son into this world. There were times when the people tried to stone Jesus to death, there were times when they tried to push him off a cliff. There were times they tried to make him their earthly king. There were times the disciples tried to talk him out of going to Jerusalem to die. In his own time and his own way, he went to the cross. He died the death that you and I deserved. He died for the times that you and I have failed to run to him first and fast. He died for the times we have questioned God's ways and God's timing. We run to him and cling to him, to him

who stands at the graveside and says, "I am the resurrection and the life, Whoever believes in me will live, even though he dies."

We cling to the promises of him who teaches us to run to him first and fast. We cling to the promises of a God who in his own way and his own time made the statement of a grieving mom come true, "Everything is all right."

Maybe we struggled with saying "Everything is all right" in the present. Maybe we are overwhelmed by the moment of tragedy striking in the world

at this time. Remember Jesus' famous words to Martha during first recorded visit, "Martha, you are worried and upset about so many things, but your sister has chosen the one thing needful." Mary was listening at Jesus' feet. But in the gospel reading for today, it is Martha who makes the beautiful statement of faith anyone can make. When Jesus asks Martha, "Do you believe your brother will rise?" She says, "I believe you are the Christ." Martha's faith shines brightly. In that statement she indicates that when your faith is in Jesus, the Christ, the Messiah, all is well." Her brother would rise and all would be made well with what is wrong someday.

Brothers and sisters, that is all in our confession that Jesus is our Savior. We fall at his feet, we run to him fast and first because we know he can help. We go to him knowing that he can help, does help in his own time and his own way. With Jesus, you can say it and believe, everything really is alright. Everything. Amen.
