#### THE FIRST LESSON

Acts 24:10-21

#### Paul asserts that the hope he has is nothing different than what was spoken throughout the Old Testament

When the governor motioned for him to speak, Paul replied: "I know that for a number of years you have been a judge over this nation; so I gladly make my defense. <sup>11</sup> You can easily verify that no more than twelve days ago I went up to Jerusalem to worship. <sup>12</sup> My accusers did not find me arguing with anyone at the temple, or stirring up a crowd in the synagogues or anywhere else in the city.<sup>13</sup> And they cannot prove to you the charges they are now making against me. <sup>14</sup> However, I admit that I worship the God of our ancestors as a follower of the Way, which they call a sect. I believe everything that is in accordance with the Law and that is written in the Prophets, <sup>15</sup> and I have the same hope in God as these men themselves have, that there will be a resurrection of both the righteous and the wicked. <sup>16</sup> So I strive always to keep my conscience clear before God and man.

<sup>17</sup> "After an absence of several years, I came to Jerusalem to bring my people gifts for the poor and to present offerings. <sup>18</sup> I was ceremonially clean when they found me in the temple courts doing this. There was no crowd with me, nor was I involved in any disturbance. <sup>19</sup> But there are some Jews from the province of Asia, who ought to be here before you and bring charges if they have anything against me. <sup>20</sup> Or these who are here should state what crime they found in me when I stood before the Sanhedrin— <sup>21</sup> unless it was this one thing I shouted as I stood in their presence: 'It is concerning the resurrection of the dead that I am on trial before you today.'"

#### THE SECOND LESSON

#### I Peter 1:17-21

#### Hope is restored when we remember that we are bought by the blood of Jesus and one day we will join him in heaven.

Since you call on a Father who judges each man's work impartially, live your lives as strangers here in reverent fear. <sup>18</sup> For you know that it was not with perishable things such as silver or gold that you were redeemed from the empty way of life handed down to you from your forefathers, <sup>19</sup> but with the precious blood of Christ, a lamb without blemish or defect. <sup>20</sup> He was chosen before the creation of the world, but was revealed in these last times for your sake. <sup>21</sup> Through him you believe in God, who raised him from the dead and glorified him, and so your faith and hope are in God.

#### THE GOSPEL

Luke 24:13-35

The Gospel according to Luke, chapter 24.

Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. <sup>14</sup> They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. <sup>15</sup> As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them; <sup>16</sup> but they were kept from recognizing him. <sup>17</sup> He asked them, "What are you discussing together as you walk along?" They stood still, their faces downcast. <sup>18</sup>One of them, named Cleopas, asked him, "Are you only a visitor to Jerusalem and do not know the things that have happened there in these days?" <sup>19</sup> "What things?" he asked. "About Jesus of Nazareth," they replied. "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people. <sup>20</sup> The chief priests and our rulers handed him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him; <sup>21</sup> but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place. <sup>22</sup> In addition, some of our women amazed us. They went to the tomb early this morning <sup>23</sup> but didn't find his body. They came and told us that they had seen a vision of angels, who said he was alive. <sup>24</sup> Then some of our companions went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see." <sup>25</sup> He said to them, "How foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! <sup>26</sup> Did not the Christ have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?"<sup>27</sup> And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself.<sup>28</sup> As they approached the village to which they were going, Jesus acted as if he were going farther.<sup>29</sup> But they urged him strongly, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening; the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. <sup>30</sup> When he was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them. <sup>31</sup>Then their eyes were opened and they recognized him, and he disappeared from their sight. <sup>32</sup>They asked each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?" <sup>33</sup> They got up and returned at once to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven and those with them, assembled together <sup>34</sup> and saying, "It is true! The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon." <sup>35</sup> Then the two told what had happened on the way, and how Jesus was recognized by them when he broke the bread.

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# THE MESSAGE

Luke 24:13-35

# Theme: Victorious Over Despair

Hope is an indispensable quality in life. Couldn't we describe the entirety of the Christian's life to be one of hope?

Years ago the *S*-4 submarine was rammed by another ship and quickly sank. The entire crew was trapped in its prison house of death. Ships rushed to the scene of disaster off the coast of Massachusetts. We don't know what took place down in the sunken submarine, but we can be sure that the men clung bravely to life as the oxygen slowly gave out.

A diver placed his helmeted ear to the side of the vessel and listened. He heard a tapping noise. Someone, he learned, was tapping out a question in Morse Code. The question came slowly: "Is ... there ... any ... hope?"

This seems to be the cry of humanity: "Is there any hope?" Hope, indeed, is the basis of all human existence in Christ!<sup>1</sup> Especially for those in Christ, we have hope!

Today we meet two disciples whose hope was fading quickly. We call them the Emmaus disciples. They were walking home to the village of Emmaus on that first Easter Sunday evening. Jesus starts walking alongside them. They didn't recognize him and I think it is important to note verse 16, "They were kept from recognizing Jesus." They were talking about the events of Jesus' death and burial. They had hung out in Jerusalem long enough on Easter Sunday to hear the reports of the women and the angels and the empty tomb.

Yet, it says in verse 17, "their faces were downcast." Why? We don't have to guess. They tell Jesus. Picking up the reading in verse 21, "We had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel." Redeem means "to set free, to liberate." Their hope was that they would be redeemed, released, set free from Roman rule over them. This was a way of thinking that was woven into Jewish thinking back then. Remember the disciples, forty days after Easter, "Jesus, are you going to restore the kingdom of Israel?" (Acts 1:8) They had their hope in political freedom. There were those who had their sights set following Jesus because might mean economic freedom, free food, no need to work any more. There were those, even the disciples, who looked to improve their social status. Two disciples wanted to go from sitting in a fishing boat to sitting at Jesus' right and left on Judgement Day.

Whether their hopes in Jesus were for the right reasons or the wrong reasons, the ultimate reason their hope was fading is they were pretty sure Jesus was dead. For them, there was no hope, only despair because why? Because they had only believed the parts of Scripture they wanted to believe, the parts that met their preconceived notions about the Messiah.

"How foolish and slow to believe all the prophets have spoken" Jesus says. "Did not the Christ have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in <u>all</u> the Scriptures concerning himself." Their eyes were opened to ever word of Scripture. Their eyes were opened to see that it all centered around Jesus. The suffering and dying of Jesus, it was all intended by God from the very beginning. The rising of Jesus was from the dead was all intended by God from the very beginning.

Because of preconceived notions, because they hadn't always paid attention to all of the Scriptures, their hope was in the wrong place.

Mr. Tabor is famous in Colorado history. He was a successful mining man, having made millions from his "Matchless mine" near Cripple Creek, Colo. He divorced his wife that he might marry a divorcee, Baby Doe. This illicit marriage became quite social events of the early West. The President of the United States was invited to the wedding—and he came.

But soon misfortune overtook them, and Mr. Tabor lost his money. He died a broken-hearted and a poor man. Just before his death he gave "Baby Doe" this final admonition: "Have faith in the Matchless mine; never give it up; it will give you back all that I have lost." Baby Doe, the now forlorn and aging widow, took him at his word. She lived near, and guarded the Matchless mine for the next 36 years of her desolate life, and stayed near the mine, in the face of repeated court ousters and crushing adversity.

In 1935 she died in a dilapidated shack near the mine, her hopes never realized. Her life was a dismal failure and she came to a sad end because she put hope and faith in the wrong object.<sup>2</sup>

By God's grace we know Jesus didn't stay dead. We know he is alive. How many times don't we trudge through life murmuring like the Emmaus disciples, "We had hoped..." We had hoped... the test results would be different. We had hoped... the relationship would be repaired. We had hoped the stock market would rise and continue rising." So easily we become disappointed. As these stay at home orders drag on, who hasn't found themselves every now and again slipping into disappointment or despair.

Too often our hope is that God will redeem us, liberate us from financial struggles or social struggles or political circumstances. When our hope is set on things that God hasn't promised, we are always going to be slaves to disappointment, despair. Like the Emmaus disciples our faces will be downcast. We can be slow of heart.

What is the prescription for being "slow of heart"? For disappointment and despair? What will help us recover?

Look at what Jesus does for these two disciples on the Road to Emmaus. Even as they have had enough, as they walk home dejected, unsatisfied, confused, hopes dashed – Jesus shows up, and with such patience. He doesn't open their physical eyes to recognize him, he fixes their attention on the Word of God. He hides himself and comes to them in the Words of the Old Testament. He shows them from only Moses and the prophets, there is the Messiah. What a Bible Study it must have been as Jesus connected the dots for them. They who thought they knew the Scriptures, had heard, maybe even memorized the words of Moses, they have their eyes opened. Their eyes see Jesus in the Word. It wouldn't be until later that Jesus would let them recognize him with their physical eyes. But for now, their hearts burned with joy. Jesus confirms to them that the Messiah had to suffer, die and then rise from the dead. In doing so their hopes are restored. If all this had to happen and it is true, it has happened, then, then, Israel is redeemed. God's people are delivered free from sin and its consequence of death.

Certainly, a Bible Study they would never forget. Jesus is the master teacher. My dear friends you don't have anything less in the Words of God before us today. The Holy Spirit is powerfully at work in us keeping the flame of faith burning brightly with the same tool, the Words of God.

Who of us hasn't had times of hopelessness in life, a confusing spot in life. We go to church, we open up our Bible, a friend speaks the words and promises of God to us – God speaks to us, "I will be with you in the good times and bad, it will work for good," and we say to ourselves, "I've heard these things before. I know. I know." Then comes the darkness and things can't seem to get any worse, the hardship we can't imagine will be any worse and we get to be like the Emmaus disciples, kicking rocks on the road thinking, "Was my faith in vain? Maybe God's promises don't apply to me."

What is the cure, it is so simple, but it takes a lifetime to learn it: it is staying close to the Words of God. We should never imagine we know it all already or we've heard it all before. Our circumstances will constantly change and so you will constantly be finding new and wonderful applications to your life.

No matter how things turn out, whether we come out of this virus with health or weather there are darker days ahead, we should say, through cloud and sunshine the Christian can continually say: By God's grace I have faith, I believe in Scripture. I am baptized, a child of God, I have forgiveness and set free from sin. I have the God's promise of grace and mercy every morning. That is enough for me. I will wait on the Lord to deliver me from this dark world. One day he will. Whether it be the day he takes me to heaven or on Judgement Day, my eyes will see him and we will rejoice and praise him.

Our prayer needs to be similar to that of the Emmaus disciples in verse 29. Stay with us Lord. They didn't recognize Jesus yet, but Jesus had opened their eyes of faith to see wonderful things in Scripture. Jesus brought understanding about life's biggest questions. He answered the questions about sin, about forgiveness of sins, what God's purpose is for us in life.

The Christian's faith leads to hope and hope is always and only based in Scripture. Without hope in Scripture and the facts of what Jesus did in dying and rising, our hope is nothing more than reasonable presumption. Think about that for a moment. The world uses the word "hope" and what they mean is they've made a reasonable assumption. Scripture is not a reasonable assumption. It is facts that our sin is real and has consequences. The ultimate consequence was laid on Jesus. After he paid for sin he rose from death.

The whole of the Christian's life is one of waiting on the Lord. The Psalmist says, "Wait for the Lord, be strong, take heart. Wait for the Lord" (Psalm 27:14). While we do wait on the Lord, and we put our hope in the word, which is about Christ and Christ alone. When we do that we will find that we are not enslaved to schedules or finances or social

struggles or politics. We don't even need to chained to worry over wealth and health and deadlines or even our own passing from this life. Instead we run to Word of God, in it our hope is found, it is ever found in Christ alone, may it be ever and always. Amen.
