
Victorious!

THE FIRST LESSON Acts 17:1-12

All prophecies find their fulfillment in Jesus. We eagerly search the Scriptures to see Jesus, like the Bereans.

When Paul and his companions had passed through Amphipolis and Apollonia, they came to Thessalonica, where there was a Jewish synagogue. ² As was his custom, Paul went into the synagogue, and on three Sabbath days he reasoned with them from the Scriptures, ³ explaining and proving that the Messiah had to suffer and rise from the dead. "This Jesus I am proclaiming to you is the Messiah," he said. ⁴ Some of the Jews were persuaded and joined Paul and Silas, as did a large number of God-fearing Greeks and quite a few prominent women.

⁵ But other Jews were jealous; so they rounded up some bad characters from the marketplace, formed a mob and started a riot in the city. They rushed to Jason's house in search of Paul and Silas in order to bring them out to the crowd. ⁶ But when they did not find them, they dragged Jason and some other believers before the city officials, shouting: "These men who have caused trouble all over the world have now come here, ⁷ and Jason has welcomed them into his house. They are all defying Caesar's decrees, saying that there is another king, one called Jesus." ⁸ When they heard this, the crowd and the city officials were thrown into turmoil. ⁹ Then they made Jason and the others post bond and let them go.

In Berea

¹⁰ As soon as it was night, the believers sent Paul and Silas away to Berea. On arriving there, they went to the Jewish synagogue. ¹¹ Now the Berean Jews were of more noble character than those in Thessalonica, for they received the message with great eagerness and examined the Scriptures every day to see if what Paul said was true. ¹² As a result, many of them believed, as did also a number of prominent Greek women and many Greek men. ²

THE SECOND LESSON I Peter 2:4-10

Jesus is the Living Stone, and he builds his church with us, his living stones, all to serve and honor him.

⁴ As you come to him, the living Stone—rejected by humans but chosen by God and precious to him—⁵ you also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house ^c to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. ⁶ For in Scripture it says:

"See, I lay a stone in Zion, a chosen and precious cornerstone, and the one who trusts in him will never be put to shame."

⁷Now to you who believe, this stone is precious. But to those who do not believe, and

"The stone the builders rejected has become the cornerstone,"

and,

"A stone that causes people to stumble and a rock that makes them fall."

They stumble because they disobey the message—which is also what they were destined for.

⁹ But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light. ¹⁰ Once you were not a people, but now you are the people of God; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

THE GOSPEL John 14:1-12

The Gospel according to John, chapter 14.

"Do not let your hearts be troubled. You believe in God; believe also in me. ² My Father's house has many rooms; if that were not so, would I have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you? ³ And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am. ⁴ You know the way to the place where I am going."

Jesus the Way to the Father

⁵Thomas said to him, "Lord, we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way?"

⁶ Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. ⁷ If you really know me, you will know my Father as well. From now on, you do know him and have seen him."

⁸ Philip said, "Lord, show us the Father and that will be enough for us."

⁹ Jesus answered: "Don't you know me, Philip, even after I have been among you such a long time? Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? ¹⁰ Don't you believe that I am in the Father, and that the Father is in me? The words I say to you I do not speak on my own authority. Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work. ¹¹ Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; or at least believe on the evidence of the works themselves. ¹² Very truly I tell you, whoever believes in me will do the works I have been doing, and they will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father. ¹³ And I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. ¹⁴ You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it. ³

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THE MESSAGE John 14:1-12

Theme: Victorious on the Only Path to Heaven

I'm guessing it has happened to you before. You start getting used to that new technology and just as you are starting to get used to used it, it's gone, it is put on the shelf. Something new replaces the "old". Now you are faced with giving up

or learning something new to replace. Technology changes rapidly. As soon as you latch on to one way of doing things, you can easily become disappointed when that technology gets shelved for something new. It is hard to keep up.

It's not just technology that changes. Things are changing in our world right now? The way we make purchases is changing, maybe you've gotten more bold venturing into the world of online purchases. I think COVID-19 is certainly going to change the way some things are done in learning, especially higher learning institutions. Will big college campuses be able to survive or will higher learning transition to online? I don't know. The way our kids learn, the way we learn is changing. There are bound to be changes in travel and large groups gathering for entertainment. Things are changing and change can be unsettling.

Maybe you wonder what changes are coming that are going to be specific to your way of life. Even without a health crisis, you know how quickly things can change in life and quickly. There are things in the future that we cannot foresee that can change our whole life. Amidst all the changes that take place in our life it can happen that one day we can enjoy prosperity and <u>security</u>, the next day there can unemployment, there can insecurity. One day we can be cheerful and <u>content</u>, the next day we can feel broken and weak and confused. One day we can be confident that we are <u>loved and</u> cared for the next day we can be left wondering if anybody cares.

Security, contentment, being loved and cared for; as human beings we crave these things. So did Jesus' disciples. With Jesus around, the disciples enjoyed all of the above. But now things were going to change, they were going to change drastically. Jesus announces that there is going to be a betrayal by one of the twelve. He tells them, "I am going to be with you only a little while longer...where I am going, you cannot come." Big changes are coming.

They had latched on Jesus' presence, they had become comfortable and secure with Jesus' visibly there with them. Jesus doesn't want them to be disappointed when things change, when he returns to his Father, when he removes his visible presence. He doesn't want them to wonder if he loves them or cares for them. It is for this reason that Jesus speaks some of the most comforting words in Scripture, "Do not let your hearts be troubled, you believe in God; believe also in me" (Jn 14:1).

Jesus is saying, "Don't let your emotions get the best of you when see what is about to happen at my trial, my suffering, my dying. Don't be confused about my love and my care for you when I stay on the cross tomorrow, Good Friday, when I am laid in a tomb. My going to the cross is showing you the full extent of how much I love you and care for you. I could have stayed in heaven clothed with all majesty, but I came to do this for you. I will suffer more than anyone in the history of the world under the weight of your sin. I am carrying out my Father's will, he loves you too. It is all so that you can have a "not guilty" verdict in my Father's presence. You will see, I will be raised to life just as I said. My resurrection will assure you that you are justified, you are just right in God's sight. There is no need to be troubled. "You trust in God? You can trust in me."

The next few hours and days were going to look very bleak. The disciples would go through a range of emotions as Jesus was crucified and buried and the words of Jesus in the back of their mind, "I am going away and you cannot follow me." Confusion, insecurity, wondering where in the world was all this going, where was Jesus leading them? Was he doing the right thing? All this change would seem to be disastrous for Him, for them, wouldn't it?

Amidst all the changes that they would experience over the next 43 days leading up to his ascension, even in the face of death itself, the disciples need not fear, they only need to cling to him. "You believe in God, trust in me." He knew what he was doing. He was still in control. "You trust in God," Jesus says, "And you know how my Father has proven himself trustworthy in the past, recall his faithfulness to his promises in the desert, he brought them to the promised land, to his people in captivity, he brought them back, every one of his promises he remembers. "I am from the Father" (:9-12). "I can be trusted," Jesus is saying in verses 9-12. "Trust in me," Jesus says

The important things in all of this is not that the disciples were so strong in trusting or their trustworthiness. The disciples would quickly show their weaknesses as they would flee from Jesus, deny Jesus. Their trust would be weak. Rather, they could have confidence in facing the future and the changes it would bring because their God was trustworthy, he was faithful. Jesus was trustworthy. His cross, his empty tomb show how trustworthy he is for us.

It is really a fascinating exchange between Jesus and his disciples and it teaches us so much on our path through all the constant and sometimes radical changes of this life. There sits Jesus at the table with the disciples. I picture him remarkably calm that evening. He is fully aware of the agony and anguish coming his way. He is about to sacrifice himself as payment for the world's sin, the disciples' sin, for your sin and mine. But in the midst of all that was about to happen to him, his concern isn't for himself, it is for his disciples. "Loving them to the end" (Jn 13:1), Loving them to the end Jesus tells his anxious and worried disciples, "Trust in me."

They are some of the most beautiful, comforting words in all of Scripture. Now, think about that evening for moment...

He has shown them the extent of his love ... he began by washing their dirty, dusty feet. He has given them a very special meal, his love for them was shown in giving his very body and blood for the forgiveness of sins in the New Meal of Holy Communion. He has told them over and over how it was necessary for him to go through with his suffering, his dying, and after three days he would rise from the dead. He gives them these beautiful words about trusting in him and his Father. He tells them clearly that if he goes away for a while, don't worry, I am preparing a home, a permanent home away from all the troubles of this life, for you in heaven, and I'll come back so you can be with me (as we just sang earlier).

They've heard it all and yet the disciples don't seem to grasp much of anything. Thomas in verse 5, "Lord, we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way?" In other words, "Jesus, we don't know what you are talking about? We don't know if this is all good for you ... for us."

Too often we are like Thomas and the disciples. We've heard how many messages about God's love and care for us in Jesus, but we aren't sure if the path he has us on is the right one, if it is good for us, how it can be for our good. We've heard how many times that Jesus had to suffer, and his followers will bear crosses to follow him, but we aren't so sure. We've heard how many times that his Word is the source of truth and yet we've looked elsewhere. How often haven't we heard that Jesus is the point and purpose of life, but we have made something else take over the number one place in our life, something we think we can't live without.

Jesus says "Do not let your heart be troubled..." and when has he ever not been trustworthy...yet we are troubled. We become afraid of what we see around us. We don't understand what is happening in our life, it just doesn't make sense to us and we . We still aren't sure if the trouble we face or the cross we bear can be turned into good. Like the disciples, we sometimes struggle to simply trust in him and his Words. When that happens, when we are feeling lost or confused....there is Jesus with patience, with love, with understanding, with sympathy. He gives his disciples, us included, something certain to hold onto.

Jesus answered, "I am the way ... No one comes to the Father, except through me." Look at the way he goes. His path involves suffering, the cross. When we don't understand life, when the pain is too much, when we've lost the point and purpose of life, look to Jesus! He is the way to the Father, follow him, his way, there might be crosses and trials to bear for his name, but it will all end in Easter victory and blessedness in the Father's house where there is no more mourning or crying or pain.

When your emotions and feelings have you unsure of the truth of God's love and care for you. When the world confuses us even more by saying truth is relative, it is whatever you want it to be, it doesn't matter what you believe as long as you are sincere, look to Jesus, the only source of truth on how to be forgiven and saved. When the world is pointing you

to the latest research over here, and the cure over there, promising that science is going to save us...(btw, we thank God for the advances in science and modern medicine, science is a blessing from God for the curious mind) but in the end it hasn't cured us from death. We look to Jesus, his truth. "I tell you the truth, whoever hears my word and believe him who sent me has eternal life and will not be condemned; he has crossed over from death to life" (John 5:24). The truth is that his love and care for us are like that of mother's care, "As a mother comforts her child, so I will comfort you" (Isaiah 66:13). God's plan for his people was good and they could trust him, like a child runs to mom for comfort.

When we seem to have lost purpose in this life, when thoughts about the end of life make us afraid, look to Jesus. His death and resurrection give purpose to our <u>life</u>, <u>real life</u>. Only in Jesus am I really alive because I am pardoned of my sin and the hope of heaven. That pardon and hope and love of Jesus compels us to not live for ourselves but for him who died for us and was raised to life for us (2 Corinthians 5:14). We live in him and he in us through his Word and the Sacrament. As we go through all the changes of this life, our life will one day be brought to a beautiful crescendo in the mansions prepared for us in heaven. Following him who is the way, the truth and the life, follow him closely through all the constant changes of this life and soon enough we will sigh, "Lord Jesus, you have done all things well."
